Any statement without the latter in the form of statistics, factual or any documented information is an assumption.

As faculty, there is a huge task on our delicate shoulders – to teach these skills, look out for opportunities to undertake research and most importantly, to bring the same to the classroom. This implies looking out for areas where they can show their related research contributions and also engaging in multi-level discussions across departments.

I would like to conclude by saying that these core competencies are essential in liberal arts programs, especially when institutions attempt to design programs and articulate their expectations from the outgoing graduates. Moreover, these are globally recognized as being vital in employment, higher education, and related spheres. Signing off, I would like to encourage you'll to 'internalize' these as they need to be enshrined in the academic culture.

FACULTY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Glimpses of how the faculties train and prepare themselves for teaching the students. The faculties attended Faculty Development Program organized by the university in summer to enrich and inculcate current and best teaching styles in the classroom. A few sessions and photographs are as follows

1). Dr Tapas Kumar Dalapati discussed nuances of research and academic writing On one of the 10 day FDP being conducted at Karnavati University, Unitedworld School of Liberal Arts and Mass Communication (USLM), invited Dr. Tapas Kumar Dalapati, Professor and Chairperson, Center for Studies in Society and Development (CSSD) and School of Social Sciences (SSS), Central University of Gujarat. The day was divided into three sessions.

First Session - Foundation of Social Research: Dr. Tapas Dalpati started with the issues of the foundations of social scientific research and explained how it is different from natural science research. Dr. Dalpati in his talk focused on the challenges of social science research and highlighted the difference between methods and methodology. He stressed on the research formulation and said that the focus should be on understanding the theoretical framework and not on data collection and interpretation to maintain the research rigor.

Second Session - Critical Reading for Literature Review: Dr Dalpati in the second session began with explaining the meaning, concept and importance of Literature review. He discussed various aspects including identifying research gaps, finding methodological inconsistencies, and justification of new research understanding of historical background. He explained various aspects in detail and demonstrated these principles. Dr. Tapas also described in detail the process to do literature review.

Third Session - Research Proposal Writing: In the third and last session of the day, Dr. Dalpati explained in detail the process of writing a research proposal. He further explained the issue of budget and grants in detail. Dr. Dalpati, who has worked in a pure research organization, also described the way to defend the proposal. He gave a list of different social science research organizations from which one should seek grants and funds. Lastly, the faculty discussed with the guest about the challenges and the logic of research at early stages of academia. Faculty also discussed the challenges of the research with undergraduate students in fields of performing art. The session was informative and interactive where almost all the vital areas of research in social media were discussed at length.

2). Dr Mamta Brahmbhatt shed light on Quantitative Research and nuances of SPSS The ten-day faculty development programme, scheduled from 27 June – 7 July 2022. Sessions from 27 June to 29 June 2022 were conducted at University level while sessions from 30 June to 7 July were conducted at respective school level. On 30 June 2022, Unitedworld School of Liberal Arts and Mass Communication (USLM),invited Dr Mamta Brahmbhatt, Associate Professor - Quantitative Analysis and Research Methodology B.K. School of Professional & Management Studies, Gujarat University, Ahmedabad, to discuss research and its various aspects. The day was divided into three sessions, in the first session, Dr Brahmbhatt discussed Introduction to research, in the second session of the day she discussed SPSS and its functions, in the final session she talked about Inferential data analysis using SPSS.

First Session - Introduction to Research: The session was insightful as Dr Brahmbhatt gave insights on the basics of research, research planning and methodology. She discussed the nuances related to selecting the database and highlighted how research articles should be read effectively to build upon a research problem. She also elaborated on reaching the title from the broader interest area of the researcher. Dr Brahmbhatt also discussed scales and introduced Orange, the software for Qualitative Research and Word Mapping.

Second Session - Handshake with SPSS: Dr Brahmbhatt in the second session demonstrated the use of SPSS. She elaborated on how to prepare SPSS ready files from Google Forms and other survey tools. She further explained how to properly present data in terms of graphs, tables and presentation. Faculty members practiced on SPSS with her. Using 2 files she discussed statistical tools like Chi Square and demonstrated the same on SPSS.

Third Session - Inferential data analysis using SPSS: In the third session of the day, the discussion started with definition and understanding of inferential statistics and difference between descriptive and inferential analysis. She further defined parameters and Null Hypothesis and discussed the new trends about writing hypotheses. Dr Brambhatt further talked about T-test and T-test family giving various examples. She also defined ANOVA and emphasized the difference and use of T-test and ANOVA. Dr Brambhatt, demonstrated how to get a P-P Graph and working with Outliers. She also discussed that Skewness when divided by Kurtosis if we get 1.96 the data is normal. Dr Brambhatt explained that a level of significance less than 0.05 is rejected. Functions of inferential analysis were also discussed with respect to paired or related data. Dr Brambhatt emphasized that if we have to be very careful with what we give in as input because the quality of the data we input will reflect on the quality of output. Major Outcome of the Workshop:

- Selecting online database
- References and finding the right Bibliography to read
- Coming up at the title from the wide subject area
- Limitations of Research areas (and not Researcher) so that gaps can be identified
- · Network with researchers to gain on expertise
- Demonstration of SPSS
- Investigation whether the data is Normal
- · Inferential Statistics is checked upon level of significance

The FDP provided faculty with valuable insights and nuances of Quantitative Research and SPSS were discussed, demonstrated and practiced.

3). Dr Susmita Halder discussed the impact of the COVID Pandemic on Students On Day 5 of the 10 day FDP being conducted at Karnavati University, 01 July 2022, Unitedworld School of Liberal Arts and Mass Communication (USLM), invited Dr Susmita Halder, Associate Professor & Head, Department of Psychology; St. Xavier's University, Kolkata to discuss Post covid effects in students: A challenge for academicians. The day was divided into three sessions. Dr Halder discussed the impact of COVID on students and the general population.

First Session: The session was insightful as Dr Halder gave insights on the impact of the pandemic on mental health and the surge in clients that the mental health sector witnessed. She also emphasized that the impact of COVID was not homogenous rather than heterogenous and in relation to individual psychological characteristics. Reflecting on the impact she discussed how guilt manifested itself in the life and mind of people leading to distress and stress reaction and majorly people were able to cope with the same. Dr Halder also discussed common changes during the time of pandemic in the Indian population, as she highlighted that the population adopted a different lifestyle adapting to the pandemic.

Second Session: The second session began with a general discussion about psychology and their perceptions of the subject. Talking about the topic Dr Halder highlighted that students faced impacts in terms of Physical Health, Social Closure, Poor Nutrition and Stress and Anxiety. Focusing on academics she discussed the knowledge gap, digital dependence, cognition and mental health faced by students. She further talked about mental health and discussed issues like depression, anxiety, health anxiety, substance use, binge eating, career anxiety and irritability amongst other issues.

Third Session: In the third and last session of the day, discussion moved towards Digital Addiction that students are facing post pandemic. Dr Halder highlighted that digital addiction affects academic functions, cognitive, personal and emotional health, social health and legal aspects. Faculty discussed various contemporary issues in the light of the topic. Dr Halder further discussed student testimony at the end to bring in more specific and practical aspects of the impact of pandemic in student life.

The FDP provided faculty an opportunity to understand the impact of COVID lockdown in the life of students and on their physical, social and mental health. In conclusion Dr Halder emphasized that teachers should identify behavioral patterns of students so that we can work towards the wellbeing of the students.

Scope of Liberal Education Model


